CHIEF OFFICER'S UPDATE REPORT

- 3.1 Topics for noting are detailed below.
- 3.1 Connect and Locality Planning Press Coverage. There has been some positive promotion of the activity and developments reported via 'UK That's TV' with planned coverage of the Learning Disability strategy, the Ageing Well Strategy, and in particular the housing development at Mainholm. This has added a further opportunity to promote the progress by our services as well as an opportunity to celebrate the innovative work that is being undertaken.
- 3.2 Leadership Programme Staff Development. South Ayrshire HSCP were successful in being offered 9 places on a recent joint Leadership Programme. The course was facilitated by Horizon Research in partnership with North Ayrshire HSCP. Over the 4-day residential the teams explored and developed key skills and strategies focused on quality improvement; systems leadership; public sector challenges and team work all aimed at achieving improved outcomes. A mix of staff across a number of teams Rachael Graham, Nicola Hunter (Planning and Performance), Kirsty Frew, Alison Gooding, Kerry Ellis (Adults and Older People), Ellison Lang, Fiona Di-Duca, Dawn Parker and Gillian Carrol(Children and Families) attended. The team proposed a number of live projects which will be progressed in the workplace.
- 3.3 AAIF's celebration. Ayrshire and Arran Improvement Foundation skills course saw another successful graduation event on the 12th November. The focus of this program is to upskill employees through real learning and action opportunities in the workplace and contributes to our wider Quality Assurance agenda. Many of the projects directly impact on the patients and service users. Participation in AAIF's helps staff develop confidence and skills to take responsibility and influence positive changes.
- **3.4** Focus on Frailty celebration event (20th November). This was a national event involving the 7 partnerships who have taken part in the Frailty Collaborative over the last 18 months to share the outputs from their work. It was a great opportunity to share with and learn from colleagues. There has been a lot of interest in South Ayrshire's Ageing



Well and Ahead of the Curve work. We also picked up ideas about one stop assessment and advice days in the community from Angus along with more acute hospital focussed work from other partnership areas.

- 3.5 Ayrshire Leadership Collaborative (21st November). Leaders from across all three partnerships and councils plus NHS, police, fire, Ayrshire college and University West of Scotland met to discuss how we can work more effectively together across Ayrshire. The aim was to share ideas and resources to address the challenges of demographic changes, financial pressures and climate change to deliver better outcomes at reduced overall cost. The day was positive and productive with a range of ideas being explored and new connections being made.
- 3.6 Patient Story This patient story from Gillian was presented at the NHS Board on 2 December and is attached as an appendix. It is a moving account of the highly valued care provided at end of life in McMillan Ward at the Biggart. The Patient Story video is a short 2 minute video.
