LOCALITY PLANNING AND REPRESENTATION ON STRATEGIC PLANNING ADVISORY GROUP

1. PURPOSE OF REPORT

1.1 The purpose of this report is to update SPAG members on key developments and issues related to Locality Planning in South Ayrshire.

2. **RECOMMENDATION**

2.1 It is recommended that SPAG members note the update re locality planning in the paper and the outline timetable for re-launch.

3. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

3.1 Locality Planning has been the subject of HSCP and Community Planning discussions in order to develop a joint way forward that allows the HSCP to fulfil its statutory duties re integration legislation, but in a more comprehensive way that enables broader locality planning linked to Community Planning Partners.

4. REPORT

The Locality Planning report at the previous SPAG meeting (30th August) set out a more comprehensive range of issues that need to be addressed and this report outlines any progress and ongoing development work.

In addition, the existing LPPs are resuming formal meetings and there is a section outlining their work, including the Small Grants/Wellbeing monies allocation process. They are also actively considering any future Locality Planning arrangements.

Process update:

4.1 Ongoing discussions with CPP colleagues

There have been discussions with CPP agencies and leads in relation to their ability to support a CPP Locality Planning approach, and, in general, there has been a positive response. A workshop with CPP Executive and SDP leads explored locality planning and it was agreed that this would be further ratified (in principal)at a formal CPP Board meeting, acknowledging the existing range of locality based working. There would also be a more explicit link with any future locality planning to Place Planning. In addition, future locality planning groups would be expected to play a significant part in the engagement linked to Caring for Ayrshire.

4.2 Formal process to change locality areas

Ensuring the locality areas are the most practical constructs is important and there is a proposed approach to support a different arrangement for Ayr. The proposed Ayr Central and North locality will target the areas of greatest need and with poorest outcomes in South Ayrshire.



4.3 Discussions on links to salient programmes such as Place Planning and Caring for Ayrshire

As part of the ongoing Place Planning work, there are discussions with Thriving Communities lead and others regarding how future locality planning arrangements can support this activity.

The formal South Ayrshire launch of Caring for Ayrshire takes place on 24th November. Following this event, it is likely that locality planning arrangements will link explicitly to the Caring for Ayrshire programme particularly in relation to public engagement.

4.4 Revised Timetable

Ensuring a timetable for re-launch that is realistic and ties up with other initiatives and activity is vital. For example:

- The LPPs will be supporting the allocation of Wellbeing and Small Grants monies over the next few months and this will also provide opportunities for wider locality engagement.
- Recruitment for the new Locality Managers will be underway soon and it
 might be helpful if these key new post-holders were in post or at least
 identified so they can attend events.
- The CPP discussions re localities needs to continue and reach some kind of formal conclusion.
- The formal process to consult on the new Ayr localities needs to be concluded.
- The formal Caring for Ayrshire launch on 24th November might also lead to ongoing links to locality planning as a part of its engagement arm.

At the next meeting of the group developing the Locality Planning work (27th October) a realistic timetable will be agreed.

4.5 Update re existing LPP

- Carers Days
- Following the successful Prestwick Carers Day in June 2022 there are plans for a Troon Carers Day on November 24th

- Currently the LPPs are considering the approach for the allocation of £21k per LPP including:
 - Agreed 'cut' of monies regarding local priorities for example a balance between allocations for one or two larger services/projects together with smaller grants
 - The timetable for allocation and process including (potentially) Decision Days
 - Links to Cosy Space initiative led by VASA
